







2018 Program Impact Report

N.C. Extension professionals in all 100 counties and with the Eastern Band of Cherokee connect millions of North Carolinians with trusted tools and technology from NC State and NC A&T. Together we enrich the lives, land and economy of North Carolinians.

Agriculture & Natural Resources

Molly Sandfoss continued to help steer the Foothills Food Hub project with several partners. She is also facilitating the establishment of the McDowell Local Food Advisory Council as a non-profit to develop McDowell County's Local Food system for economic development & food security. The McDowell County Center is on the forefront of raising awareness of our local food system to the public by improving opportunities for increasing local food access by increasing food access points, hosting grower-buyer meetups, and hosting a public awareness event, McDowell County Farm to Table.

Adam Lawing had an active youth program with Livestock Judging, Junior Livestock Show, & Agriculture Awareness Field Day. The Livestock Judging team had an award-winning year and members attended a camp in Oklahoma. Adam also worked with the Cattlemen's Association to provide programming in animal husbandry and pasture management.

Molly & Adam aided 4 producers who secured \$24,000 in grants through 2018 WNC AgOptions program. These grants are often geared toward increasing production or diversifying.

Matt Burneisen had several successful litter reduction programs. The annual Lake James/Catawba River Cleanup removed 6,500 pounds of debris. Matt also initiated classroom learning opportunities at 3 schools.

Family & Consumer Sciences

Janet Bryan partnered with MCS and other agencies to deliver the Expanded Food & Nutrition Education Program. EFNEP graduated 22 adults and 14 youth. With EFNEP, families are eating healthier, preparing food safely, and moving more.



NC State Extension are leaders in food safety & food preservation. Cathy Hohenstein provided training for 8 individuals in food preparation and preservation. She provided food preparation demonstrations at the Tailgate Market using fresh, local food. Cathy also provided a certification opportunity in Safe Plates for food service employees. She is our liaison with the Old Fort Extension and Community Association. The Old Fort ECA provide community support to the Old Fort Library and Old Fort Elementary School Media Center.
